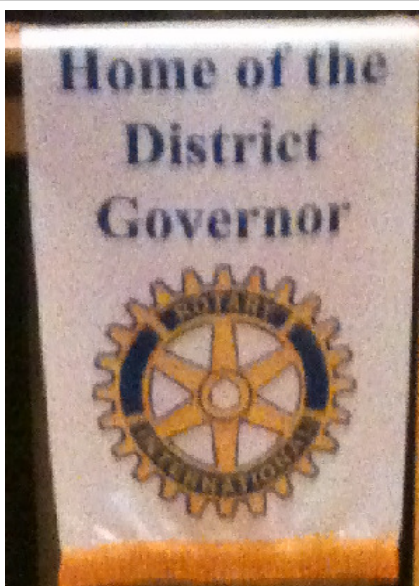

Last week's Speaker – Member behind the Badge
